HOW TO BECOME A CHRISTIAN

One promise of the Royal Ambassador Pledge is “to become a well-informed, responsible follower of Christ.” To accomplish this part of the Pledge, you have to first become a follower of Jesus Christ. You must become a Christian. God loves every person in the world, including you! He loves you so much that He wants to be with you forever. But you have a problem. That problem is called sin. Sin is doing what you want rather than what God wants. Your sin keeps you from being with God forever. But because God loves you, He made a way for your sins to be forgiven. God sent His Son, Jesus, to earth to live and then die for the sins of the world! The good news is that Jesus died for your sins! He came back to life and is alive today in heaven. Jesus is now with God. Jesus is the only way we can be with God.

To be with God forever, you must believe in Jesus. You must believe that Jesus died for your sins and that He is the only way for you to be with God. Tell God that you believe in Jesus. Then you must ask Him to forgive you of all your sins. Tell God that you know Jesus died for your sins. Once you do that you promise Him that you will try to do what He wants you to do. Finally, you ask Jesus to come into your life to be your Lord and Savior. Jesus will come in your life and will help you live for God.

When you do these three things, you become a Christian. A Christian chooses to live for God. He no longer wants to do things his way but wants to do things God’s way. How do we know what God wants? All we have to do is read the Bible. God tells us how we should live in the Bible.

Lessons For Larissa

If you didn't get a chance for a long time to do something you really enjoyed (like playing baseball or eating pizza), would you miss it? Larissa did. She enjoyed playing the violin and taking violin lessons. She missed it after her family moved to the Czech Republic when she was 11 years old. Her family serves there as church planters.

Finally, someone directed Larissa and her parents into a room. What a shock! There were many teachers waiting to hear Larissa play. This was an audition to be accepted into the music school. Larissa tried not to be nervous.

Larissa performed very well. When she finished, the teachers asked Larissa and her family to leave the room. After what seemed like forever, the director came out. He said, "I will call you to tell you if it is possible."

What did that mean? Did they like her playing or not? All Larissa could do was wait. After two days, the director of the school called. He wanted them to come to the school the next day. He told them they would find out "if it is possible."

At the school, the director still didn't tell them "yes" or "no." He led Larissa and her parents to a teacher. They hadn't met her on the first visit.

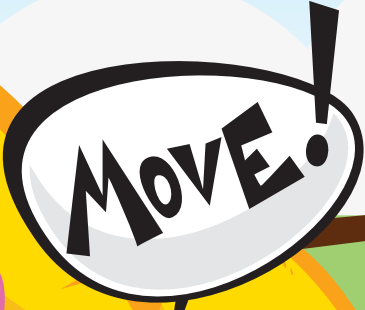

ROADBLOCKS

Dennis Janz and his sons (Andy, Josiah, and Caleb) chatted as they finished eating. The next morning they would embark on a mission trip. Dennis and his wife, Jody, are church planters in South Africa. But the adventure ahead would be in Binga, Zimbabwe. Dennis and the boys would travel by car along with a group. They would take packages of food to starving people.

Dennis told the boys about Zimbabwe. "People are starving, and they don't have jobs," he said sadly. "They are dying because they don't have food or health care." He explained to the boys that Christians have a responsibility to help others when they can.

"I'll wake you early," Dennis said. "We have eight hours of driving tomorrow. So be responsible and get plenty of rest tonight. I don't want any grumpy passengers." The boys laughed. They were excited about this trip with their dad.

The next day Dennis and the boys traveled to Botswana with the rest of a group of Christians. They had 16 people in four vehicles. After a good night's rest, they went to passport control to get special permission to enter Zimbabwe. There were many counters with official-looking people. Dennis went to one of these counters. He asked for the form they needed to cross the border. The guards at the counter did not have the form. They went from counter to counter trying to find the form. No one had a copy of it. Finally, one of the guards told them to write their names, addresses, and types of vehicles on a piece of paper. The guards stamped the paper for them. When they were finished, they had been to four different counters. It took 90 minutes to get the paperwork they needed, but no one complained.

When they reached the gate at the border, Dennis had to fill out more forms and get travel insurance. Finally, they were on their way. It would be another eight hours of driving before they reached Binga.

As they traveled, the group had to stop at many police roadblocks. Each time they showed their papers and the police let them pass through. Everyone was thankful they had been responsible and had gotten all of the correct paperwork. The team arrived in Binga late that afternoon. Getting to Zimbabwe had been like going through a maze!

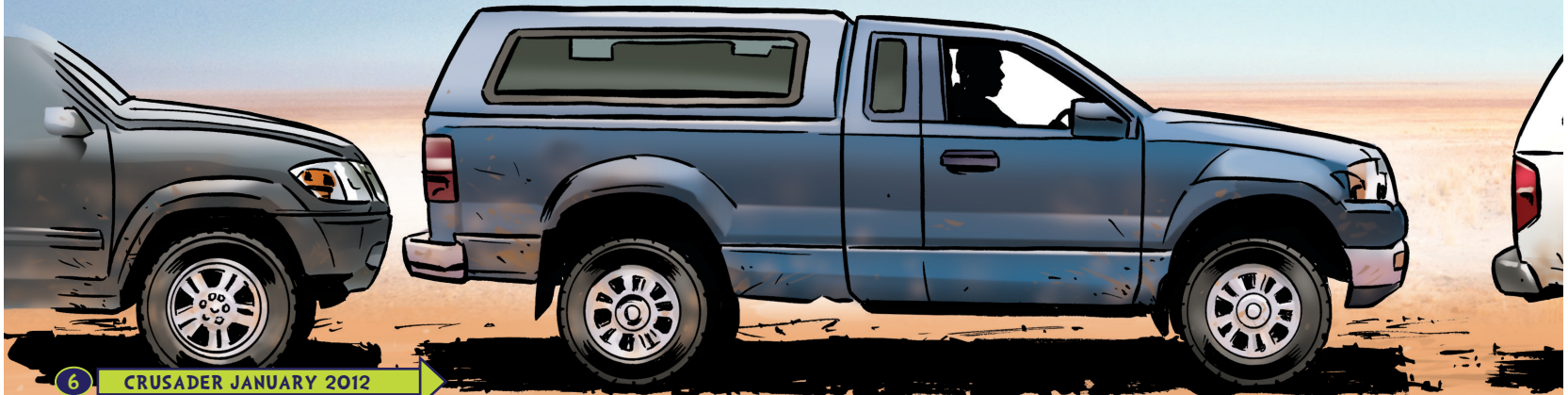
Early the next morning, everyone worked hard to load the trucks with food. They loaded 500 packages onto the trucks. The packages weighed 60 pounds each. After the trucks were loaded, they drove the food to the starving people and gave it to them. Andy, Josiah, and Caleb worked hard and did not complain. Everyone worked so well they finished a day early.

At home Dennis told his wife, "Andy, Josiah, and Caleb never complained about the temperature, being thirsty, or being hungry. Even when we had no electricity, they did not have negative attitudes. They had positive attitudes about everything." Dennis was proud of his sons. They had been responsible helpers.

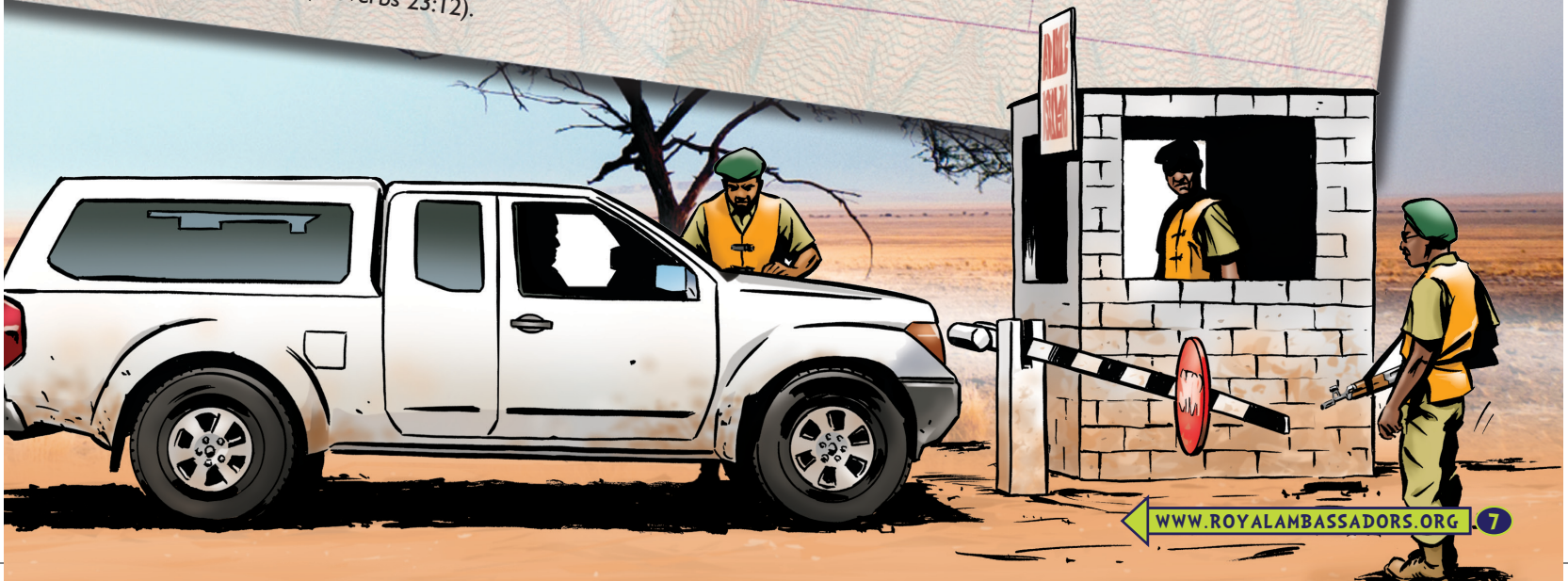

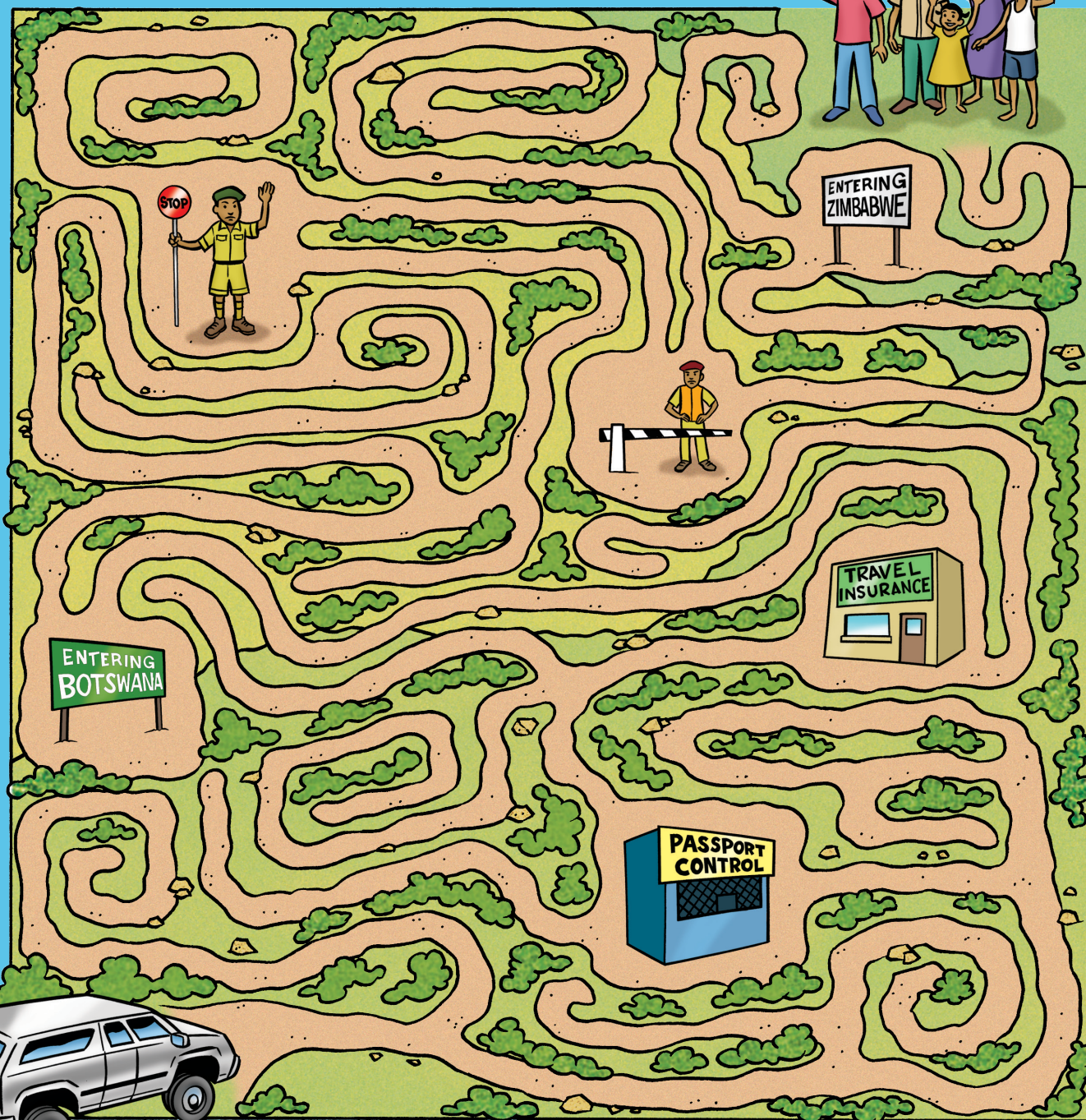

The men in the aviation ministry of the North Carolina Baptist Men like to fly airplanes. So do lots of RAs in North Carolina. It's a perfect match. Thanks to the North Carolina Baptist Men, RAs from across the state of North Carolina get an opportunity to fly in an airplane. Often, it's the first time they've ever flown.

The men joined the aviation ministry so they could use their interest in flying airplanes to help churches and missionaries in North Carolina, the United States, and around the world. To be qualified to fly in these missions causes, the men need to have flown planes for a certain number of total hours.

It also helps the men keep their flying skills sharp. Taking RAs (and GAs) helps the men get their extra hours and helps the kids get the experience of being in an airplane. Everyone wins!

"Most of [the kids] are just elated," said Bob Joyner, who is a long-time RA leader and a pilot who serves as a part of the aviation ministry. "I've had parents tell me that their kids got up at the crack of dawn, they were so excited. They really love it."

When the men take the kids on a flight, they often fly the kids over their church so they can pray for it. They also spend time before the flight explaining a little bit about how the aviation ministry helps missionaries and churches. Several hundred kids go on these flights every year.

Sounds like a lot of fun!

FROM INDIANA WITH LOVE

Thousands of soccer fans traveled to South Africa in 2010. They went to the country to watch the World Cup. It was the first time the World Cup had been held in an African nation. The entire country burst with excitement about the games.

Dennis Janz is a church planter in South Africa. He wanted to tell the soccer fans coming to South Africa about Jesus, but he could not do the job alone. He asked some volunteer groups to come to South Africa to help him. One of the groups that came was from Indiana. They were college students from Graceland Baptist Church.

The mission team from Graceland found creative ways to tell people about Jesus. They held soccer clinics for children in several villages. Although the weather was freezing cold, many children came to the clinics. Some of the children came in coats and boots. But some of the children had very little clothes and no shoes. They did not mind the cold weather. They were excited to meet the Americans and play soccer.

The American college students taught the children soccer drills. They used a special soccer ball, called an EvangeBall. The ball had five different colors: black, red, white, green, and yellow. The mission team used the colors on the ball to tell the children how they could become Christians. They held contests for the children who came to the clinic. Team members taught the children how to dribble, pass, and shoot the ball. Then the children competed to win the EvangeBalls.

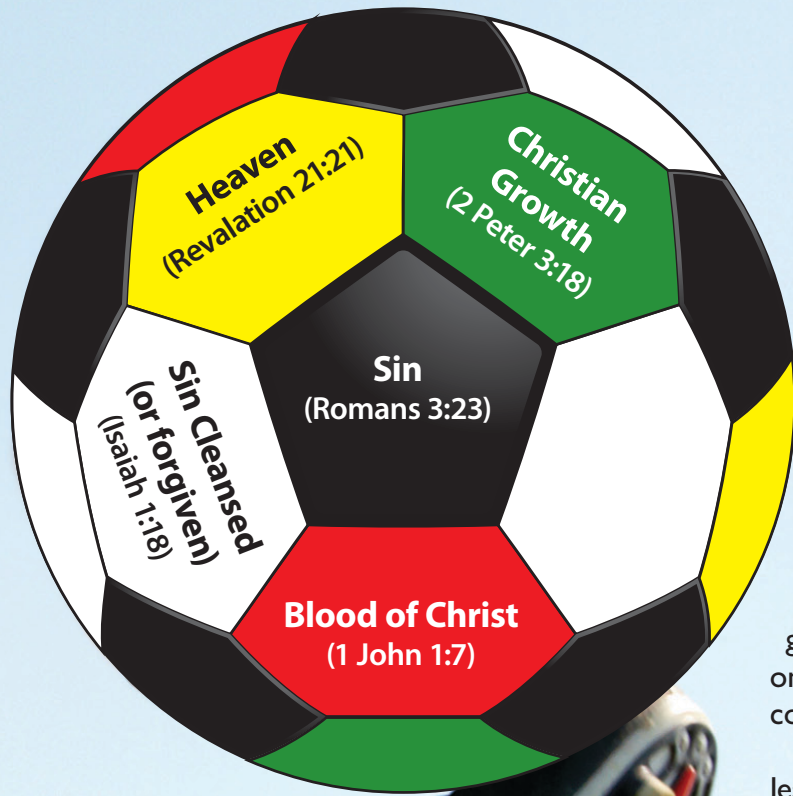

Some of the children who came to the soccer clinics were girls. The young women on the mission team painted their fingernails for them. They used the same colors as the EvangeBall on the girls' fingernails. As they painted the girls' fingernails, they told them about Jesus.

In many villages the people had no electricity. They could not see the World Cup games. The mission team set up a huge screen on a soccer field in the village so the people could watch the games.

The mission team also showed a movie about Jesus. Even though it was freezing cold outside, the people sat for two hours to see the film. They were able to hear the story of Jesus' life in their own language. One man approached the team when the movie was finished. He had tears in his eyes. He was so happy to hear about Jesus. The man told the students he hoped they showed the film over and over again so many people could see it.

Many South Africans heard the story of Jesus because students from America traveled there. The students were glad they took the time to go on the trip. Maybe one day you can go on a mission trip. Be responsible and start getting ready now. Learn everything you can about Jesus. Practice telling others about Him. Then, when the time comes for you to go, you'll know exactly what to do!

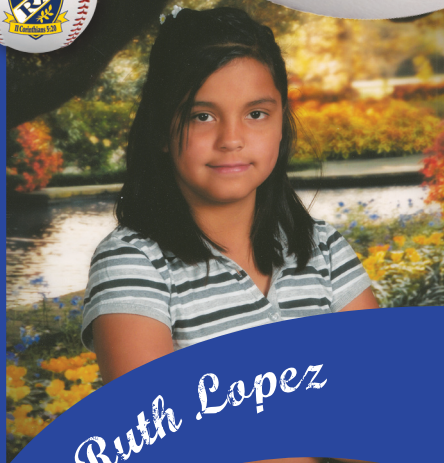
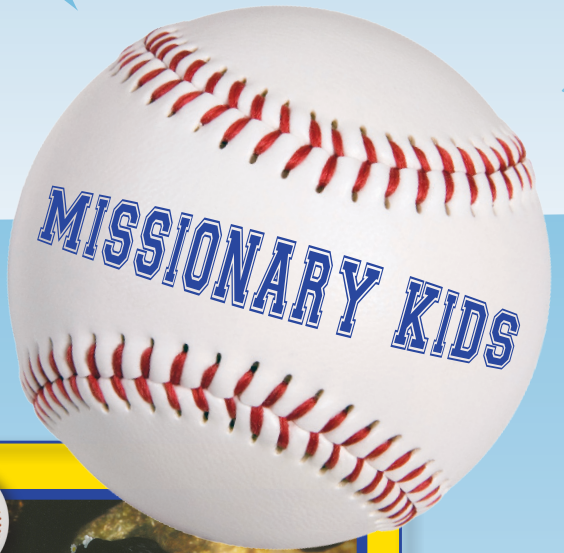

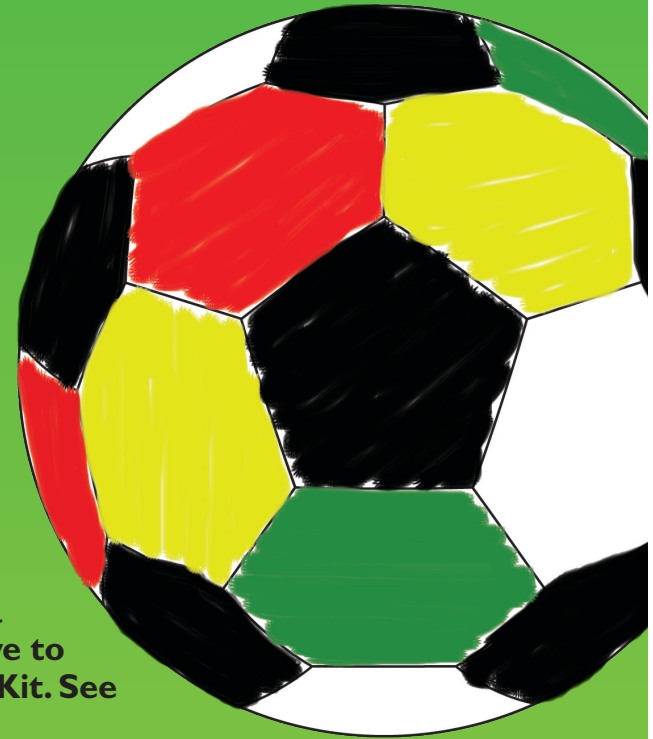

- Show them your decorated soccer ball and explain what the colors mean. You can find an explanation and a template to make a *Evangelistic Soccer Ball Book* to give to your friends on the *Game On!* DVD in the RA Resource Kit. See instructions on L15 in *Crusader Leader*.
- Have everyone stand in a circle. They are all kickers.
- Have one boy stand in the middle of the circle. He is the soccer blocker.
- Choose one boy on the edge of the circle to be the first kicker, and give him the soccer ball.
- To begin the game, the first kicker will kick the ball across the circle to any other kicker standing along the edge of the circle.
- The soccer blocker will try to stop the ball.
- Kickers will continue to kick the ball back and forth across the circle to one another until the soccer blocker is able to block and stop the ball.
- When the soccer blocker stops the ball, he joins the circle. The player who last kicked the ball then becomes the soccer blocker.
- Neither kickers nor soccer blockers may use their hands to direct or stop the ball.
